November, 2019, in which he extolled the value and beauty of friendship, a virtue that is often underrated in today's society. What follows is the first installment of three brief summaries of his letter. The Prelate started by reminding us of the constant teaching

Jesus lived it. As true God and true man, Jesus was the ultimate friend, taking advantage of everyday situations to initiate friendships and pausing his activity frequently to spend time with others. Through his empathetic friendship, Jesus accompanied those who were suffering, as he still does with us today. That knowledge that Jesus is our true friend who will never fail us is what our confidence is based on, and we respond to his friendship by striving to unite our will to his and live our lives as he would want us to do. Monsignor Ocáriz continued by pointing out that friendship has great human and Christina value: it is noble; it desires the good of the other; and its growth is dependent on how

much time we put into it. Loving friendship has been a sign

of Christianity from the beginnings of the Church, making

the early Christians excellent examples of true friendship.

The Prelate mentioned in particular St. Basil and St. Gregory of Nazianzus, saints who habitually encouraged each other to live ever greater virtue. Their childhood friendship

An accomplished horseman and entertainer, as a young man, he worked at a Chicago educational fair, directing the stagecoaches, horsemen, and the pony express. Dick, as he was known then, met Fr. Joseph Muzquiz, an Opus Dei priest, and mentioned that he would be interested in making a retreat. Fr. Joseph agreed immediately, but then Dick admitted that working seven days a week, he didn't see






